Welcome to the trophy known as Glenalmond Estate! A PROPERTY YOU HAVE TO SEE TO BELIEVE! The moment you start to ascend the tree lined driveway a sense of calm, privacy, and happiness prevails. This immaculate home and property is the epitome of superior craftsmanship and quality in both the home and garage, but also the meticulous grounds. This gorgeous 7000+ sqft masterpiece is rich in history and sits on over 50 acres of rolling hills, country club like landscaping and features four fish ponds to create a park like property. The home has too many features to list, including six baths, an indoor pool that is heated with solar panels, custom finishings from Brazilian Cherry hardwood floors to hidden appliances, full guest suite, 5000+ sq ft garage, and many many more.

The estate was originally named Glenalmond in 1877 by its owner James Crerar. He was from Glenalmond, Perthshire, Scotland. There were originally 24 acres that went with the house. After being passed down to various members of the Crerar family, the house and land was owned by the McKennas (owners of the famous Pictou Twist Tobacco Company of Pictou,) Henry MacDonald, William Clarke, Byron Clarke, Charles Homes, Foord Construction Company of Stellarton, William Sinclair, Merle Pratt and Paul Calvie families. It served as the Glenalmond Tour Home and William Clarke farm (40 years, and later Tyrol Inn and Lobster Pot Restaurant.

The original stone house was torn down in 1968 when the restoration attempt was not possible, the current owners then bought the property in May 1993. Picture perfect property now has 54 acres fully landscaped and makes a magnificent entry into the historic Pictou town.

The grounds are meticulously cared for, and the lawns were created by using a "rock picker" to create rock free top soil. The ponds are 20-30 feet deep, and have geotech cloth at the base to keep
